Join us for a tour of Bradford's historic police museum, located on the site of the original 19th century police station in City Hall. Visit the charge area and cells used by Bradford's police for a hundred years, as well as the beautifully preserved Victorian courtroom.

Our courtroom is only accessible by stairs, so a video of our courtroom is available for those unable to view it.

Why TOUR & EXPLORE!

Touring our venue is a case of walking through history, experiencing first-hand what it must have been like to be a Victorian inmate awaiting trial or police officers going about their job in the building throughout its history. Many of our volunteers are all former serving police officers. With in-depth knowledge of the collection and experience of being 'bobbies on the beat', there are plenty of stories to keep groups engaged and inspired. Tours last approximately 1 hour, but you'll need extra time to explore the gallery space and exhibits.

Historical Loan Box: Ordering the Law

Take the opportunity to let your pupils get hands-on with historical objects within their own classroom, asking questions, formulating their ideas and developing their understanding of crime and the Law.

Perfect for...

All ages and abilities, across Key Stages 1, 2, 3 and 4, including the history curriculum, British values and citizenship themes. Ideal for incorporating drama, role play and hot-seating activities into your pupils' learning.

Our loan box is packed full of real historical objects, supplemented with copies of our unique primary source material and some replica items. Designed around core curriculum requirements, it will support your students as they start to make sense of the complex legal system and the laws which govern us.

What better way to explore the challenges facing our police force than through the paraphernalia that protects them? Handle a bobby's helmet, truncheon and whistle. Try out a rattle and handcuffs. Learn about the origins of Bradford's police force and the rules they obeyed - and make links to your own classroom. All the objects are accompanied by a set of teachers' notes, including a range of age-appropriate questions and suggested activities.

Booking Information

We can advise on the best package to suit your students' needs. All visits include a tour of the museum, cells and courtroom. Teachers and other adult helpers are admitted free of charge.

We recommend that schools book at least 2 months in advance wherever possible. There is a ratio of one adult for every eight children.

Facilities

It may be possible for groups to eat packed lunches, strictly by arrangement in advance. However, we do ask that groups take every appropriate measure to ensure the public gallery is tidied up afterwards.

On sunny days, there is plenty of space outdoors for schools to eat around the pool (City Park). Toilets are located close to the museum, on the far side of the pool in City Park (forming part of the Pavilion Café area). Regrettably, we have no toilet facilities available within the museum but teachers are welcome to take groups outside for a break before returning to the museum.







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Risk assessment and access

Teachers are invited to a free teacher-visit in advance of any group visit, where a risk assessment can be carried out. Please note that the museum contains uneven flooring in places (particularly the van dock) and the historical courtroom is normally accessed up a flight of steep steps. We are happy to discuss any concerns about access and to make alternative arrangements for children with reduced mobility. Please discuss this in advance of your visit.

Safeguarding

The tour and museum deal with subject matter of a sensitive nature in an age-appropriate way. However, please ensure that your guide is aware of any pupils likely to be distressed by aspects of the day, for example tours of the prison cells. Teachers are expected to take appropriate steps to ensure the safeguarding of vulnerable pupils. Many of the volunteer guides are retired Bradford police officers. All guides have been vetted in accordance with the Barring and Disclosure service.

As well as visiting and touring the museum, we have an exciting drama-based workshop designed to support the GCSE history requirements for a study of Crime and Punishment. You can also borrow our exciting box of historical objects to use in the classroom.

A real-life encounter with the past will support students' study of Crime and Punishment for their GCSE course, from the Victorians up to the present day, including:

- The causes and types of crime
- The nature of crime at that time
- How law and order has been enforced
- The effectiveness of methods to combat crime
- Changing attitudes to crime and punishment





Increased, hands-on engagement with the Victorian legal system will enhance students' understanding of the historical context of English Literature, including works within the crime genre by Charles Dickens, Robert Louis Stevenson and Arthur Conan Doyle.
